
Information is available for each Patriot listed above. You may view it by scrolling down through the pages that follow. The Patriots appear in alphabetical order of last name then the first name.

MORE OF MARTINS FERRY STORY: Captain Martin was employed by the federal government as a surveyor in the Northwestern Territory. On examination of ms field notes it seems that he had been engaged in surveying for several years in different localities in the territory. (e)

Absolom Martin established a ferry across the Ohio River from which the city of Martins Ferry received its name. (e)

MORE OF HER HISTORY: During the 1782 siege of Fort Henry she went from the fort to the house of her brother Ebenezer Zane where some powder was stored. Tradition has it that she tied a tablecloth around her waist, and filled it with powder. Fleet afoot she returned to the fort amid volleys, unharmed. She is quoted as having said; "A man will be such a great loss but I will not be missed." (a)

Betty Zane lived about two miles above Wheeling on the Ohio side. Her first husband died leaving her a widow at forty years of age. Betty's second husband, who was 20 years old, was a wanderer from Virginia who fell in love with her and induced her to marry him. They lived on Colerain Pike at which place Betty died. A statue of Betty, at Walnut Grove Cemetery in Martins Ferry, was dedicated in 1928 in honor of her heroism at Fort Henry in J 782. It was erected by the school children of Martins Ferry. (g)

<u>MORE OF HIS HISTORY:</u> (c) (d) (e) Ebenezer Zane commanded a regiment of Virginia Militia. In 1777 he participated in the defense of Fort Henry against a large force of Indians and others, which was the first attempt of the British and their savage allies against the frontier after the Revolutionary War began.

On September 1782 Fort Henry was attacked again by a force of Indians and British Rangers. After another three day siege the British and Indians were repulsed. It was during this siege that Ebenezer Zane's youngest sister, Elizabeth, ran from the fort to her brother's house and returned with powder.

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: In the capacity of a spy, and a guide he directed the forces through the wilderness in several of the important campaigns from the commencement of the Dunmore war until the close of the Revolution. He was a guide in Wakatomica campaign of I 774. He also accompanied General Brodhead in the same capacity in the expedition up the Allegheny River against the Munsics and Senecas in 1779, in which he was wounded.

In the memorable campaign of Crawford against Sandusky, Zane was again one of the guides to direct the army through the wilderness, and was a confidential advisor of the commander, with whom his opinions had great weight. It is plain, too, that if his advice had been promptly acted upon, the terrible calamity that befell the unfortunate expedition would have been averted. (b)

He once returned from hunting his horses, saw 5 Indians jump into the river and swim for the island near his home. He was able to dispose of all five of them with his rifle. The Indians called him "the Death Wind". ~~~' He was a stalwart fighter during the stirring events around Fort Henry. (g)
