While these specific pages cannot be used as actual proof of Revolutionary War service, it can be very helpful as a guide. The reference section for each Patriot contains all of the sources used to validate the information presented on this webpage and would be invaluable on a membership application for the Sons or Daughters of the American Revolution.

The cemetery is located in Wheeling Township. On US Route 40 westbound from St. Clairsville, turn right on to State Route 331 to Uniontown. Proceed for 4.5 miles then, turn right on to Township Road 66 out of Uniontown and proceed 0.7 miles to the "Y" intersection with Township Road 64. Bear to the left and continue on Township Road 66 for 1.1 miles. The cemetery is on the left.

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: Some sources state that George Brokaw was born in Germany, However, the memorial erected by the family in Crabapple Cemetery and the LDS Ancestral File state that his great grandfather was Bourgone Broucard (a French Huguenot) who arrived in America in 1645. The Brokaw farm was in Athens Township, Harrison County. For many years there was no Presbyterian Church in New Athens. Presbyterians living on the eastern side of Athens Township went to Crabapple, which was close to Athens Township, but located in Wheeling Township, Belmont County. Persons living on the western side of Athens Township went to Nottingham Presbyterian Church. Some of George's descendants are on the membership rolls there.

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: There are copies of thirteen deeds in Harrison County, Ohio, for land purchased or sold by John and Esther McCollough. It appears that they lived first in Green Township and later Athens Township near New Athens. He was an attorney and was appointed the first circuit judge in Southeastern Ohio. (a) The old sandstone markers for John and Esther have crumbled in Crabapple Cemetery. The church history indicates that they and their family were active members of the church.

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: Robert was a devote Presbyterian. He, William McCullough, and Daniel or David Merritt were the first elders of Crabapple Presbyterian Church which they helped organize. He gave substantial amounts in his will to the American Bible Society. He was a farmer in Ohio. At one time he owned land in Guernsey County, Ohio, but did not live there. It is important to note that the booklet, "McCullough Family" several libraries in this area, by Harriet Speers combines two McCullough families. Her John McCullough who married Jane Forsyth was not John McCullough who married Charity Kritzer. They had no children. Mrs. Speers' John's parents were David and Jane Kincaid McCullough, not Robert and Jane McCullough. (a & h)

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: In the year 1803, Robert and William McCullough sent to Georgetown, Harrison, (then Jefferson) County, Ohio, for "Samuel Hanna to come up and help them form a 'Praying society.' He came, and from this germ planted in the wilderness, sprang Crabapple" Presbyterian Church, the first and largest church organization in Wheeling Township, Belmont County. The first sermon was preached by the Rev. John Rea, and the church organized with forty members in 1804. (j)

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: In his affidavit dated July 26, I 820 soldier stated the following regarding his military service: He enlisted in the spring of 1776 as a private soldier at the town of Roxbury, Massachusetts into Captain Spaulding's Company of James Reid's Regiment of the New Hampshire Line and served under the above named officers the whole time in the Canada Expedition under the command of General Sullivan. After the expiration of the aforesaid, he reenlisted into Captain Daniel Shay's Company belonging to the 5th Massachusetts Regiment commanded by Rufus Putman for a term of 3 years. After serving until a little previous to the end of said time, he reenlisted under the same captain and regiment which was commanded by the same colonel for and during the war. (d)
