JOHN HAUN (lived and buried in Harrison County, Ohio.)

<u>BORN:</u> 1758 (a) <u>SON OF:</u> unknown <u>DIED:</u> 1826(b) <u>AGE:</u> 68 years (c) <u>BURIED:</u> On his farm in German Township, Harrison County, Ohio <u>MARKER:</u> No <u>MARRIED:</u> Yes, but marriage date is not known at this time.

SERVICE IN THE REVOLUTION:

General: Private in Delaware, in the Virginia line and in Pennsylvania militia

- Specific: John Haun was a private, 5th class in Captain John Garrit's Company in Christiana Hundred commanded by Colonel Thomas Duff in 1778 in Delaware. (d) He served in the 4th Virginia Regiment under Colonel John Neville and also the 8th and 12th (e, f) and in the Pennsylvania Militia in Northampton County as a private second class in the Fourth Company under Captain Peter Roath in 1781. (f)
- **<u>RESIDED</u>**: He lived in Delaware, Pennsylvania, and Ohio, and may have lived in Virginia and Maryland, He had a 640 acres farm in German Township of Harrison County, Ohio.(b)

WIFE: ELIZABETH (maiden name unknown) (no other information known at this time) (b)

MORE OF HIS HISTORY: Attempts to find John Haun burial site has been made. The farm has been cut into smaller parcels and some of it has been disturbed in surface mining. One story that has persisted is that he was killed by Indians on his property and buried where he was found.
